Animation – Week 1, 2, and 3

The class will use animation as a medium, to create a ‘theater of the impossible’ performance - drawn, acted out, or sculpted live under a camera. Students will be presented with works by filmmakers from around the planet featuring experimental animation to introduce the imaginative richness of the animation medium.

Art – Week 1 and 2

Paper Mache - Anime Drawing – Abstract Art

Students will create Paper Mache sculptures—a construction method that consists of pieces of paper bonded together using a wet paste or glue which becomes solid when the paste dries. Students will learn the styles and techniques of traditional Japanese Anime drawing as well as creating their own mini manga comic book. In the Abstract Art section of this track, students will explore the basics of painting and drawing. Students will have the opportunity to work with acrylic and watercolor paints and learn the basics of color theory and gain insight into the world of paint.

Castaic Lake Recreation – Week 4

Students will learn safety rules and water awareness safety, while participating in group activities. In addition to lifeguard events, students will have boat rides and go snorkeling and have races / activities with skills learned during the week.

Film - Beginning – Week 1 and 5

These sessions are designed for the first time filmmakers. Each session takes you into the production process, as each filmmaker will shoot and direct a chosen story, in a multi-day, multi-location film shoot to create your own DVD!

Film - Advanced – Week 4 and 6

Prerequisite: Students must have attended Beginning Film or the JSI Film in summer 08, or have attended any SCV Film Festival camp.

Fit Teens – Week 2 and 6

Students are taught how to get involved in the "Fun & Fit 4-Week Challenge" and how to make fitness a bigger part of their lives. In addition, students learn good eating habits while they participate in "Get Fit Basic Training," - healthy well-rounded-workouts.

Math and Science – Week 1 and 3

In week one, game design will be explored using game design software. Polyhedral modeling and formulas, prime numbers, Fermat’s Last Theorem, calculus and logical paradoxes will be explored through fun activities. Geoscientific topics will be discussed with an emphasis on hands-on engaging laboratory experiences and a survey of the local geology of the Santa Clarita area. During week three, students will have hands-on learning with micro and nanotechnology to explore objects that students cannot see but know exist. The mathematics of music, infinity and beyond, and codes and ciphers will be explored. Students will learn about sending secret messages, deciphering coded messages, and the mathematics behind internet security. Both weeks utilize a multimedia approach to learning combined with a highly interactive classroom experience that promise to be fun!

Musical Theatre – Weeks 3 and 5

Students explore the acting process while preparing to perform in a musical production. From auditions to curtain call, this exciting workshop involves students in all aspects of musical theater. Week three’s production will be "We Go Together" from Grease and week five’s production will be "One" from A Chorus Line. Sing and dance all week long while preparing a performance for your family and friends. Topics include: Jump Start: how to prepare a great audition song; Get it Right: proper vocal technique; Cold as Ice: tips for an effective cold reading; Story Tellers: every song tells a story; and Break it Down: learning to dance in theater.

Special Effects – Week 2

The special effects campers will be introduced to production techniques, which are used by the special effects teams on the studio back lots, in order to create effects for movies and TV. Each camper becomes a member of a special effects camper team and gets to practice the techniques learned in camp.

Technology: 3D Design, and Fabrication – Weeks 1 and 6

Ever wondered how things are designed and created? In our Design and Fabrication workshop students will learn about the world of 3D CAD design and standard part fabrication techniques used to make different types of parts by modeling a catapult design in class, culminate in a catapult contest. Week 6 is a repeat of week 1.

Technology: Robotics, Roller Coasters & Bridges – Week 2

Lego robots, rollercoaster design, and software are discussed and explored through activities and projects. Students will learn to use Lego controller software, program Lego robots, have robot races, and establish Lego robot program parameters. Rollercoaster physics will be discussed with topics such as gravity and g-forces. Students will build rollercoaster tubing and marbles, design a wooden rollercoaster, and design a steel rollercoaster.

Technology: Welding and Computer Networking – Week 3

Students will fashion a steel flower by cutting steel with aviation snips, spot welding, drilling, riveting, oxy-acetylene brazing and hand forming of metal using pliers. During the computer networking section of this track, computer fundamentals: Processor, RAM, Motherboard, Power Supply, Hard Drive, Input/Output will be explored. Students will do several activities such as assembling a computer kit and building a Web site.

Technology: Welding and Wireless Technology – Week 4

Students will learn to use the GMAW, Gas Metal Arc Welding, (MIG), electric welding process and will create a lamp base using steel flat bar. Planning, measuring, cutting, grinding, clamping and simple jigs, are part of the lamp fabrication process. In the Wireless Technology section of this track students will discuss wireless fundamentals, radio waves and frequencies. Students will build a wireless network.

In the Architecture section of this track, students will be given an introduction to AutoCAD software, draw floor plans, and discuss design concepts, education requirements, and career paths.

FECHAS DE INSCRIPCIÓN

CONFIRMACIÓN DE LA INSCRIPCIÓN

No se remitirán cartas confirmando la inscripción en las clases. Tenga la bondad de ir a la primera clase, y el instructor le confirmará que su nombre se encuentra en la lista de estudiantes. Si la clase está llena o ha sido cancelada, la Oficina de Educación Comunitaria y Continua se pondrá en contacto con usted.

ADMISIÓN A LAS CLASES

Se admite a los estudiantes en el orden de inscripción. No se permite que los estudiantes asistan a clases en las que no estén oficialmente inscritos. Los estudiantes deben asistir a clase el primer día. De lo contrario, pueden perder su sitio en la clase y éste se le puede dar a un estudiante que esté esperando para inscribirse. Se permite que los estudiantes se inscriban en muchas clases a lo largo del semestre siempre que sea con permiso del instructor.

AUSENCIAS

Se espera que los estudiantes asistan regularmente a clases. Debe haber un mínimo de estudiantes en clase el primer día para que la clase continúe. Además, la clase puede cancelarse si hay faltan muchos estudiantes durante el semestre.

Los estudiantes que no asistan a clase regularmente se arriesgan a perder su sitio en la clase, el cual se le puede dar a otro estudiante que quiera asistir. Como regla general, cualquier estudiante que falte más de dos semanas puede perder su sitio, a menos que haya llegado a un acuerdo con el instructor.
