- The Liberal Studies track is specifically tailored for transferring to CSUB, which is located at the University Center on the Valencia campus. Students transferring to another institution should consult a counselor.
- The Business Accounting Transfer track is specifically tailored for transfer to CSUN. Students transferring to another institution should consult a counselor.
- The Social Science track is specifically tailored for transfer to Chapman University located in the University Center at the Valencia campus. Students transferring to another institution should consult a counselor.
- AA degree without transferring requires only math 070—(see counselor for details.)
- Some classes have prerequisites—(see counselor for details.)
- Additional requirements may apply for transfer students—(see counselor for details.)
- Business and Liberal Studies are not UC majors. Students planning to go to a UC should take the Social Science track and work with a counselor on fulfilling major requirements.

Who are PACE students?

Since the Spring of 1998, hundreds of students have earned their associate degrees and transferred to universities to pursue advanced degrees through the PACE Program. Most of our students are working adults between the ages of 24 and 50 who reside in Santa Clarita.

What if I haven't been to college before or have been out of school for a long time?

COC offers a wide array of support services, and PACE students have the option to work together in study groups. Still, many returning students find that math and English courses pose special challenges. COC offers preparatory math and English classes every semester.

How can I become a PACE student?

1. Complete a College of the Canyons application
2. If you are new to College of the Canyons, you may be required to complete the New Student Online Orientation
3. Take the free English and math placement tests
4. Consult with a counselor*
5. Attend a PACE Information Meeting
6. Register and pay for classes just like any other student

**A counselor will assess previous college classes you've completed and advise you about which classes you need in order to achieve your long-term goal.*

What Is PACE?

Progressive Adult College Education is an accelerated educational format for busy adults who want to reach their educational goals while meeting the demands of their active lives. While the traditional semester lasts for fifteen weeks, most PACE classes run in seven- or eight-week sessions. If you take two classes during each seven- or eight-week session, you are able complete 12-15 units per semester. PACE classes normally meet five selected Saturdays for two and one half hours each. Summer classes may vary in format and scheduling.

By following our pre-determined curriculum for five to six semesters, you can fulfill most requirements for your associate degree and prepare to transfer to a university.

What can you study through PACE?

- Business Accounting (transfer option)
- Liberal Studies
- Social Science

What's special about PACE classes?

- Students follow pre-determined curriculum to meet requirements
- Most classes are *hybrid and meet on selected Saturdays
- Accelerated classes that can be completed in seven or eight weeks
- You take classes with other mature, motivated adults
- Study groups can help you succeed

How are PACE classes similar to traditional COC classes?
