Course Overview

This course is designed to help students succeed in college and in life. This is achieved by helping students explore who they are, understand where they come from, and decide where they are going. The process is supported by concentrating on the success factors of motivation, self-esteem, and skills. The student is guided through a process of self discovery which emphasizes the importance of self-awareness, self-responsibility and self-empowerment. This course focuses on the importance of self-empowerment – the process of taking control of one’s life.

Student Learning Outcomes

- Develop a plan of action that will enable the student to choose, perform, and modify appropriate study skills for college success.
- Consistently demonstrate the life skills of decision making and problem solving while responding to a diverse society.
- Select and use appropriate college and university resources.
- Evaluate personal, professional, and academic situations and apply critical thinking models to formulate a desired outcome.

General Course Objectives

- Identify skills necessary to function successfully in the college environment.
- Distinguish their learning styles through active participation, critical thinking, and completion of various learning style inventories.
- Identify a goal-specific college objective.
- Analyze interests, personal values, traits, and abilities as a result of vocational assessment, interpretation, and group discussion and identify at least one appropriate career objective.
- Practice acquired study skills through team presentations, objective tests, essays and displays of subject matter mastery.

- Analyze the structure of higher education and evaluate the process and procedures in transferring to a four year university.
- Access college and university support staff and programs and identify to whom questions/ requests for assistance are to be made of.
- Analyze numerical data, tables, charts, and graphs pertaining to occupational inventories taken.
- Evaluate what diversity means in regards to community, culture, race, class, and gender as well as their role relative to this diversity.
- Assess personal, mental, physical and psychological health issues.
- Examine shared governance and leadership of the college and university.
- Construct time management strategies which will assist students with organizing their lives.

Expectations:

Classroom Behavior

- Absences will affect your grade as attendance and participation are part of your grade. ***Three late arrivals or early departures (15 minutes or less) will equal an absence. **You will not receive a passing grade if you have a total of more than 3 absences (including absences and tardiness) regardless of the number of points you have accrued!*** Please remember, you are committing to attending class every week at our scheduled time unless you are ill.
