Canyons Athletics Wins 1st WSC Supremacy Award

WESTERN STATE CONFERENCE

- The Western State Conference (WSC) Supremacy Award was established during the 1980-81 academic year to recognize Athletic Departments for their "excellence and diversity in WSC athletic competition".
- The Supremacy Award is based on the finish of each athletic program in particular sports, and at the end of the season, the Supremacy Award is given to the program with the most points.
- For the 2013-14 academic year, in August COC was named winner of the WSC Supremacy Award!
- College of the Canyons is just the ninth school to win the award in the history of this award.
 - CONGRATS to our outstanding Athletic Department, Coaches, Trainers and Athletes on this amazing award! Go Cougs!



Newhall Foundation Grant

- At the end of the Fiscal Year, the COC Foundation received a \$50,000 matching grant from the Henry Mayo Newhall (Family) Foundation.
- COC matched this grant with another \$50,000
- The purpose of our request was for funding the renovation of our Medical Laboratory Technician (MLT) laboratory classroom
- Statewide, demand for MLTs is expected to grow by 20.3% (there is a need for more than 1,100 new MLTs by 2020!)
- Eighty percent of all medical diagnoses require laboratory tests for confirmation of diagnosis; delays in lab results can jeopardize the timeliness of diagnosis and treatment





PTK Student Receives Honor

- In June, Jessie Warme was selected as the recipient of the Phi Theta Kappa's 2014 Hites Transfer Scholarship, the Society's most prestigious and largest scholarship!
- Only 10 students from more than 2,200 applicants were selected for this \$7,500 scholarship!
- Jessie was a valuable member of the Model UN team and the Forensics team. She also volunteered her time and knowledge to travel to Nicaragua with Claudia Acosta to help needy schoolchildren by building and installing water towers they desperately needed.
- She graduated from COC in 2014 and will be attending UC San Diego this fall.







COC Sustainability Center Gets Honorable Mention


- The California Community Colleges Board of Governors announced the winners of the 2014 Energy and Sustainability Awards.
- On Sept 9 awards were given to community colleges or districts that promote energy efficiency and sustainability on their campuses.
- Under the category of Faculty/Student Initiatives, Skyline College took top honors for the waste diversion efforts of the Green Gorillas, a student-led environmental advocacy group on their campus.
- COC received an honorable mention in this category for its water conservation and petrochemical devices project.

- The COC women's golf team wrapped up a remarkable season by finishing just three strokes back of eventual state champions College of the Desert, to take second place at the 2014 CCCAA State Championship held Nov. 16-17 at Morro Bay Golf Course.
- The women's golf team finished in first place at the WSC Finals held Oct. 26-27 at Brookside Golf Course in Pasadena to win the program's first conference championship since 2010.
- In addition to winning the program's eighth conference title, all six COC golfers have been named to the 2014 All-WSC team -- a school first for both the men's and women's golf programs.
 Freshman Alexis Miller and sophomore Kathy Quock join Whitaker, Webster, Mortensen and Youn as all-conference selections.
- COC assistant coach Carla Loomis was named conference coach of the year.







Model United Nations Team (MUN)

- This year's Model United Nations team (MUN) along with their advisor, Phil Gussin participated in the **TrojanMUN Competition** hosted by USC on October 30th through November 2nd.
- Students from UCLA, Claremont-McKenna, Berkeley (including the former president of the COCMUN Club), UC Davis, Univ of La Verne, and a number of other colleges and universities were there to compete, and COC was one of only two community colleges participating. We had 23 delegates, the other college had two!
- Three COC students won Honorable mentions: Naomi Cheriegate (President of the MUN Club), Ryan Arroyo, and Elise Levy. (Ryan and Elise also won awards at the COCMUN conference we hosted in the University Center in October).
- They competed against some very qualified students who are, in many cases, farther along in their educational careers, but COC always comes out strong and holds their own! We are very proud of them!

Cross Country Teams Win Big at State!

- The College of the Canyons men's cross country team is hoisting a state championship trophy for the first time since 1975, as the Cougars ran to victory at the 2014 California Community College Athletic Association (CCCAA) Cross Country State Championships held Saturday, Nov. 22, at Woodward Park in Fresno!
- With its win, the men's cross country program achieves the cross country equivalent of a triple crown season -- taking the WSC title, the SoCal Regional title and the State Championship.
- The women's program took the WSC's second spot before placing third in Southern California, but second in the state!
- Head Coach Lindie Kane also becomes the first female coach to win a CCCAA men's cross country state championship.



New Grant for the Art Gallery

- Congratulations to Larry Hurst and the COC Art Gallery for receiving an \$8,000 grant on December 2 from "Arts for All".
- "Arts for All" is a local group, working through Cal Arts, that raises funds to support the arts in the Santa Clarita Valley.



"InnovationMaker" Grant Series to Strengthen STEM Teacher Workforce Recruitment and Training

- On December 4, COC was awarded a \$120,000 grant by the California Community College Chancellor's Office as part of the "InnovationMaker Grant Series.
- Renee Marshall has been spearheading this to continue the Teacher Preparation Pipeline Program.
- The grant was awarded to 10 community colleges with existing Teacher Preparation Pipeline programs to more effectively recruit and train students for careers as teachers STEM (science, technology, engineering, and math), K-12, adult education and career technical education (CTE).





Student Chemistry Club Receives Award!

- COC's Chemistry Club has been selected to receive the American Chemical Society (ACS) Green Chemistry Award for its activities conducted during the 2013-14 academic year.



That same day, Bruce Fortine was on SCTV



Junior High School Summer Institute Was Back!

- The popular career exploration-themed Summer Institute at COC held two sessions in July which were open to students entering the seventh, eighth and ninth grades.
 Over 125 attended the Institute.
- The sessions provide hands-on career exploration and learning opportunities to students in a variety of areas such as robotics, video game design, sports medicine, health care, digital photography, architecture and alternative energy fabrication.
- Enrollment fees were \$225 per class, which includes all materials and a property of the second and a property of the se

Distance Learning

- Expanded the use of Open Educational Resources, so that open textbooks are now saving students over \$500,000 in textbook costs per year
- Delivered training on OER at universities in Tunisia, Saudi Arabia and Jordan as part of a
 program sponsored by the US Department of State. COC was the only US institution of higher
 education to participate in the program.
- Delivered keynote address to the annual conference of the Educational Technology Organization of Michigan.
- Developed a new online orientation for prospective PAL students.
- **Collaborated** with Veteran's Center and TLC to engage in outreach about online and PAL classes.
- Awarded funding for Student Equity Plan proposals for improving online classes and expanding PAL offerings.
- Supported a record number of students completing the PAL orientation for a single semester (FA 14 has 865 new PAL students)





- Focus was on deepening conceptual and statistical knowledge to enhance the teaching of Introductory Statistics at the community college level. (18 hours of presentations and learning activities.)
- Twelve of the college's faculty members will be mentored by a leader in the statistics education community during the fall semester.
- The institute was a pilot project for a National Science Foundation grant that would allow College of the Canyons and Villanova University to provide much-needed statistics training to community college mathematics instructors on a national scale.


Over **200** Chancellor's Circle members, community members, administrators, staff and faculty gathered for this year's Chancellor's Circle Dinner on October 25.

"Canyons Hall" Student Services/Administration Building

- Construction began March, 2013; Move in began December 3, 2014
- Includes 90 new offices (Counseling 20, Financial Aid 13, Admissions/Records 14, other special programs 2, Admin Offices 25), 4 conference rooms, student gathering spaces
- Houses A&R, Financial Aid, Career Services, Counseling, Transfer, Chancellor, PIO, CIO and SS/administrators
- Build out of added space will include the Mail/Switchboard, Sustainability Center, Veterans Affairs, Community Education and the Foundation



Institute for Culinary Arts - "iCue"

- Construction began summer of 2013; Move in to commence mid-December 2014; Classes to begin February 8th!
- Funding came from multiple sources: Foundation, Family Campaign, Bid Savings from previous projects and Measure M
- Includes 2 teaching kitchens, demonstration kitchen, sweets kitchen, wine studies classroom and 3 offices

 Interior dining room will seat 100-120; exterior patio will seat 40-60







Prop. 39 – Energy Efficiency Projects

- The District received \$515k from the State for phase 1 projects, which included replacing all pneumatic thermostats with electronic controls
 - This project will be completed in February 2015
- The District received \$430k from the State for phase 2 projects, which includes the replacement of 4 ea., 40-year-old HVAC units serving Bonelli and Boykin; combined with the State's Scheduled Maintenance Grant for 2014/15 of nearly \$300k, this project will be completed without any District funds
 - This project will be completed in March 2015
- Five additional water bottle filling stations were added to the campus
- An electric vehicle charging station was installed at the CCC









Simi Dabah's Sculptures

- Simi Dabah is a self-taught artist/welder who has been creating steel sculptures from scrap for more than 40 years. He is a prolific artist who believes that using scrap materials to create works of art is both friendly to the environment and inspirational to the viewer.
- As part of its ongoing 45th Anniversary Celebration, College of the Canyons hosted a dedication ceremony for the Simi Dabah Sculpture Collection on November 6.

- This is the largest collection of installed sculptures in the world!



College2Career Day Draws full crowd!


Held in the University Center on September 27 from 9-1pm, this popular event hosted hundreds of young people curious about college pathways and potential careers.





- Revamped the ISP website to be an effective recruitment tool
- Completed a recruitment trip to China in November, visited 5 schools, and talked to 600 Chinese HS seniors
- Developed programs for Comprehensive Internationalization:
 - ➤ International Student Mentor Program
 - > Peer Program for International Students
 - > A Series of Workshops on Acculturation
 - ▶ iCOC: CCIE Grant: Serious of Events to promote Internationalization on campus
 - Social Media Engagement: Facebook, Twitter, WeChat (China), and Line (Asia)







ISP Continued: Proyecta 100,000

What Is Proyecta 100K?

- Agreement between countries between the United States and Mexico to improve economic relations, cultural understanding through scholarly exchanges
- ➤ Between 2014 and 2018: **100K** students from Mexico on scholarship to improve their English and learn about American culture
- COC is among the 160 Institutions selected
- > 95 Proyecta Students at COC
- Most students stay with homestay families.
- ➤ 12 Workshops; Trips to Museums and Fun Places; Numerous Campus activities









Visit from Universidad TecMilenio Students

- Dr. Claudia Acosta facilitated the establishment of a partnership between COC and Universidad TecMilenio from Monterrey, Mexico.
- Twelve students from TecMilenio campuses located across Mexico arrived on July 6 and spent several days studying English, interacting with COC staff and students, and practicing their conversational English before departing on July 18.
- Designed to assist these students with English language skills, the development of the College's intensive, 'English for Business' course represents the first time that Universidad TecMilenio has partnered with a California community college for a student exchange program.
- While here, they met with reps from the SCVi Charter School and visited City Manager Ken Striplin.





Chinese Visitors to COC

- Between August 25 and August 29, we had two visitors from China on campus.
- This was a collaboration among the ISP, SCV Economic Development Corporation and the COC Economic Development Division.
- This was the first official visit from Yuwhati High School, one that Dr. Jia-Yi Cheng-Levine visited in April to establish a partner school relationship with COC.





Institutional Research

- Accomplishments Resulting from Leadership in the Research Office:
 - Published 36 reports and briefs.
 - Developed, administered and analyzed data for 37 surveys.
 - Updated the Fact Book in June 2014.
 - Provided 5-year trend data, including disaggregated data by student demographics for academic departments.
 - Provided data for 11 grant applications.
 - Provided evaluation support for 10 institutional grants.
 - Received the statewide Institutional Effectiveness and Technical Assistant grant.
 - Supported Student Equity through research, development of the plan and facilitation of RFP meetings.
 - Completed 11 external surveys, including accreditation and federal mandates.
 - Conducted 8 on-campus presentations pertaining to research, planning, institutional effectives and emergency preparedness.
 - Conducted 9 off-campus presentations related to institutional research, planning and effectiveness

Institutional Research - cont'd

- Upgraded the District's copier fleet to provide more functionality and reduce the number of printers on campus through consolidated printing to the copiers.
- Deployed new, small form factor computers in the Student Services Administration building.
- Migrated the online student application to Open CCC Apply saving over \$10k per year.
- Increased the seating capacity of the computer labs at CCC and added a new lab to meet demand at the campus.
- Purchased an online Comprehensive Educational plan for students to be available Fall 2015.
- Developed a Technology Innovation fund to encourage faculty to try new technology in the classroom.
- Continue to virtualize our server environment to increase redundancy and reliability.
- Provide students with access to Office 360 through their student email accounts.
- Deployed Office 2013 to the campus and replaced the remaining Windows XP computers.

IN-PROGRESS ITEMS

- Adding the ability for faculty to indicate SLO Assessments on the Web Advisor Grade Screen.
- Deployment of Blackboard Analytics to provide more robust reporting features for our online courses.

Grants Expand Our Revenue Base

Expanded our revenue and continued to innovate through awards from public and private entities fund innovation, and enable the college to bring additional services online for students and the community.

- This year has seen \$7.5 million in grant funding to date a significant infusion that jump-started new initiatives.
- The following is a brief overview of significant grants awarded or launched in Fall 2014.
 - AB 86 Adult Education Planning Grant— The AB86 Adult Education Grant is funding for The Santa Clarita Valley Adult Education Planning Consortium. The consortium consists of COC and the Wm. S. Hart District to provide a comprehensive local plan for Adult Education. The plan is to focus on 5 Educational Areas: Basic Skills- High School diploma and Equivalency (i.e. GED); Disabled Adults; Immigrant Ed. i.e. civics, Citizenship and ESL; Short Term CTE and Apprentiships. Award: \$221,880
 - ➤ Teaching Math Instructors to Teach Statistics (National Science Foundation IUSE grant) —
 Partnership with Villanova University to create a "train the trainer" professional
 development program to teach community college math instructors across the country to
 teach statistics . Award: \$111,673 over 3 years.

Significant Grants Awarded or Launched for 2014-15

- Title V (U.S. Department of Education) The College of the Canyons' Title V funds will create an online student educational plan and will expand online counseling so more students who are unable to engage in regular on-site appointments can have an appointment,
 - ✓ Award: \$2,578,430 over 5 years
- > SBDC Go-Biz (State of California) The Small Business Development Center will use these funds to hire adult hourly consultants who will be able to help small businesses identify capital for their businesses.
 - ✓ Award: \$70,000
- Mental Health and Suicide Prevention The College of the Canyons' Campus Suicide Prevention Program will improve student mental health by reducing student risk factors and eliminating suicide and attempts.
 - ✓ Award: \$296,530 over 3 years
- Institutional Effectiveness and Technical Assistance Program grant (California Community College Chancellor's Office) College of the Canyons, in partnership with Foothill College, the Statewide Academic Senate and the RP Group, will develop an institutional effectiveness and technical assistance program to benefit all California Community Colleges and students.
 - ✓ Award: \$12.5 million over 4 years, 7 months





Economic Development - CACT / ETI

So far this year, the Center for Applied Competitive Technology (CACT) and the Employee Training Institute (ETI) have:

- Delivered 45 training programs to:
 - > 519 individuals
 - > From **74** companies
 - Achieving 17,568 touch hours of training



- Utilized the CACT specific SB1070 funding to support STEM throughout the region in awarding fifteen high school robotics programs \$5,000 grants to support their competitive robotics programs (\$75,000 awarded in total)
- Partnered with COC's CTE program, the City of Santa Clarita, William S. Hart School
 District and six manufacturing companies to host 120 Hart District students and 70
 industry participants in our first ever celebration of National Manufacturing Day
- Expanded the integration of the CACT program from a Santa Clarita focus to a regional focus serving all eight colleges in the SCRC (Antelope Valley to San Luis Obispo) including on-going membership on the Ventura County WIB Manufacturing Committee
- Partnered with the COC Welding department to deliver the first Boy Scouts of America Welding Merit Badge program

Economic Development – SBDC

In 2014 the Small Business Development Center (SBDC) provided one-on-one consulting and trainings to local businesses and the results were amazing!

- SBDC client companies achieving an increase in sales of \$24.3M and raised \$13.9M in new capital.
- In partnership with the Ports of Los Angeles, the SBDC hosted a highly successful import/export program with over 40 companies, in two cohorts.
- The SBDC supported the establishment and growth of 791 businesses by providing 3,777 hours of subject matter expert consulting, resulting in 56 business starts, 681 jobs created and 209 jobs retained
- Delivered 193 training events to 3,310 individuals.



Economic Development - WorkSource

The Santa Clarita WorkSource Center had a very successful year!

- Exceeded our annual goals for enrollments and placement by a minimum of 15% for three years running.
- Assisted over 12,600 community members with their efforts to gain sustainable employment; over 1,050 client visits a month.
- Created partnerships with Career Services, the San Fernando Veteran's Employment Committee, Priority NeoPost, NewMarket Careers, project Management Institute and City of Santa Clarita Libraries.
- Held over twenty recruitments and Job Fairs in the past 12 months.
- Partnered with Human Resources and Career
 Services to present the quarterly workshop
 "Demystifying the Community College Employment Process".





Economic Development – ICT / DM

Information & Communication Technologies/Digital Media

The Information & Communication Technologies/Digital Media grant was new this year and was off to a great start!

- Collaborated with 31 educators in an Industry and Educational Advisory Roundtable to define and prepare students for workforce readiness in Health Information Management and Healthcare IT.
- Collaborating closely with William S. Hart School District in special events such as Manufacturing Day and upcoming Hour of Code.
- Presented and represented COC at the STEM K-12 conference on building career pathways.
- Working to host and deliver the second edition of the highly successful statewide CCC Digital Media Educator Conference in June 2015. This two day conference is designed to connect faculty with industry. Conference focus: "Business is Digital".



Spring 2015 FLEX Week


Spring 2015 FLEX week will take place February 2 – 6.

LEAP

- A survey was given to all LEAP participants in spring 2014, and of those who responded:
 - > 57% have become involved in a community organization or joined a board
 - 20.5% received a promotion to a higher level position at COC
 - > 51% are pursuing additional education (professional development opportunities, mentoring, graduate education) to increase their potential of acquiring additional leadership skills or a new position
 - > 58% have taken on new responsibilities in their current position



- > 54% have successfully implemented teambuilding strategies learned during LEAP
- ➤ 61% have engaged in advocacy efforts (for their own department/program, a community organization, or a statewide initiative)

LEAP 1 will be offered next in spring 2015

Management Academy

- The inaugural Management Academy was launched in fall 2014, with 24 participants. This program was designed to help participants develop the critical skills that managers need, including working with others, helping a team be productive, resolving conflicts, giving feedback, correcting performance problems, and coaching. 

- LAO 2015-2016 Fiscal Outlook
 - Projects additional one-time Proposition 98 resources for 2014-2015.
 - ✓ Estimated at \$270 Million
 - ✓ First call on funding is to pay off Apportionment Deferrals
 - Foresees strong Proposition 98 revenue increase for 2015-2016
 - ✓ Estimated at \$700 Million
 - ✓ First call on funding is to pay off any remaining Apportionment Deferrals
- The Governor may use more conservative revenue projections in the 2015-2016 January Governor's Budget to be released January 10th.



Statewide Leadership in Professional Development

- Leslie Carr and the 4C/SD board (California Community College Council for Staff and Organizational Development) worked to advocate for AB 2558, whose purpose is to provide state general funds to community colleges for supporting locally developed and implemented faculty and staff development programs.
- The bill was signed into law in September 2014 by Governor Brown.
- 4C/SD will take a leadership role in assisting community colleges with the implementation of this legislation.
- 4C/SD has partnered with TTIP South and OEI to develop an online Professional Development repository.
- The repository will contain online training workshops, a speaker's bureau, and resources for professional development coordinators such as sample needs assessment surveys, FLEX schedules, leadership programs, and other best practices in Professional Development contributed by community colleges.
- The plan is to launch the repository in fall 2015.



WEDPAC Regional Meeting Approaching

COC will be coordinating a South Central Regional Consortium meeting for the WEDPAC Initiative on January 29th at Ventura College.

- This is part of a statewide economic and workforce development effort and will include faculty and administrators from 8 different colleges and people from Workforce Investment Boards.
- We expect significant increases in funding opportunities and a willingness to look at structural changes helping to remove any barriers.
- It's a wonderful opportunity identify strategies to remove major barriers and advance college's efforts to preparing students for great jobs.
- This is essential for California's economic health and community colleges need to be a central driver.



Board of Governor Task Force on Workforce, Job Creation and a Strong Economy

Scope

Consider strategies and recommend policies and practices that would:

- Prepare students for high-value jobs that currently exist in California,
- Position California's regions to attract high-value jobs from other states and around the globe,

Senate Bill 967 - Yes Means Yes

The new law requires:

- Definitions of affirmative consent, sexual assault, domestic violence, dating violence, and stalking.
- Outreach programs required as part of the orientation for every incoming student.
- A range of comprehensive prevention strategy trainings/sessions available for students.
- Where and to whom to report an incident.
- Proper procedures and protocol for investigating incidents and maintaining confidentiality.
- Training for campus officials involved in investigating incidents.
- Notification to victims about on-campus and off-campus resources and services.
- Wide dissemination of the newly revised Board Policy and Administrative Procedure to students and employees.

We will be creating a website addressing sexual assault prevention as well as provide printed materials for students.

Student Equity Plan Progress!



- In mid-Spring, the Chancellor's Office announced \$70 million for statewide student equity planning, which included \$628,000 for College of the Canyons.
- At COC, a student equity committee has worked hard since that time, hosting a collegewide Student Equity Summit, announcing a "request for proposals" (RFP) for creative ideas to address student equity data, and participating in a great variety of conferences, division meetings, and college workshops.
- ✓ The equity committee has also coordinated its activities closely with the Student Success and Support Plan (3SP), the Basic Skills Initiative (BSI), as well as developing plans such as the AB86 workgroup and the recent Title V grant.
- COC's Student Equity Plan was informed by extensive campus conversation and approved by the Board of Trustees at the November 12, 2014 meeting (ahead of the January 2015 deadline!)
- Activities to support student equity plan objectives will now begin in earnest and we are anticipating additional funds available next year as well!

- Projects and Activities for the Student Equity Plan include:
 - RFP/Proposals for activities connected to student equity data and multi-year objectives
 - Equity Support Activities such as institutional research support
 - Research & Inquiry Groups for the five student success indicators and working groups to increase the impact of special programs

College Rewarded with Title V Grant

- In securing a competitive five-year, \$2.6 million Title V grant, College of the Canyons -- a qualified Latino-serving institution -- has the opportunity to enhance the educational experience in serving its increasingly diverse student population.
- Latino students currently represent the largest single demographic of students at COC, comprising 43 percent of the student body.
- In total, the non-white student population at COC has tripled since 2000 and now sits at over **60** percent.
- Seventy percent of students who are Latino work part time, with an additional 25 percent committed to fulltime jobs.
- The resources that a Title V grant provides for COC will make it easier to address these issues with new procedures and increasingly specific objectives.



College Rewarded with Title V Grant

- The grant will be directly allocated to improvements which include online educational plans, expanded online tutoring programs, increased use of open educational resources, online counseling and increased faculty training for culturally congruent pedagogy.
- While these initiatives are being implemented as a result of Title V funding, all COC students will reap the benefits.
- By Sept. 30, 2016, the college aims to have fully accessible online counseling and educational planning, with a participation rate of at least 50 percent.
- By 2018, Title V funding is projected to raise that participation rate to at least 70 percent.
- By 2019, the final year under grant funding, COC is projected to have trained an additional 250 full-time and adjunct faculty in culturally relevant pedagogy.

U.S. Department of Education

Center for Civic Engagement

- We are currently discussing the creation of a Center for Civic Engagement which could bring together: Service Learning, Volunteer Bureau, Civil Rights Project, Ethics & Policy Institute and perhaps more.
- Congressman McKeon would like to donate archives from the past 22 years to COC (160 boxes of historical documents).
- Focus would be on how to cultivate stewardship and servicing of non-profit boards; and, student engagement.
- Priorities for fund raising include:
 - Provide ongoing funding for a Social Sciences lecture series
 - Develop student internship opportunities at the federal, state and local levels
 - Create endowed scholarships in the Social Sciences
 - Develop workshop series that addresses Civic Engagement
 - ➤ Identify funding to expand Project-Based Learning for students
 - ➤ Identify funding to evaluate, archive and document image relevant components of the McKeon collection.



New Grant to Increase Institutional Effectiveness

- COC was awarded a \$12.5 million grant (\$2.5 million a year for just under 5 years) from the Chancellor's Office to increase institutional effectiveness of California Community Colleges while reducing the number of accreditation sanctions and audit findings. We will do this through the following:
 - ✓ Create an online clearinghouse.
 - ✓ Offer additional workshops/webinars to supplement the existing resources.
 - ✓ Create technical assistance teams.
 - ✓ Create an Executive and Advisory Committee.
 - ✓ Conduct an evaluation by the RP Group.

In conducting these activities, the State Chancellor's Office, the Statewide Academic Senate, RP Group Consortium (RP Group, 3CSN, CLP), Foothill College, and Lee Consulting will be partners. We also plan to reach out to ACCJC to partner with this group to take advantage of this amazing opportunity!

3SP Program

- The Student Success Act of 2012, sometimes referred to as SB1456, required all colleges in the state to adopt new regulations related to registration, orientation, education planning, and follow-up. Put simply, beginning in Fall, 2014, priority registration was dictated by Title 5 regulations. To that goal, we have:
 - Put the structure in place:
 - Communicated the changes well in advance of the plan being activated.
 - Developed a budget for the Student Success Plan.

 - ➤ Planning for adult education to be offered by COC in partnership with the Hart District noncompetitive grant.
 - Diane Stewart is project director.
- Center for Excellence
 - Pilot faculty work groups will be meeting in Spring 2015 to evaluate existing training options and develop high impact practice models.
