PTK members maintain a **3.5 cumulative GPA**, participate in honors programs and are active with academically rigorous coursework; awards, honors, and receive recognition for academic achievement, leadership and service to the college and community.

- Our students were 4 of the 75 students selected from the 112 California community colleges.
- COC's PTK chapter (Alpha Nu Xi), has been recognized as one of the 30 international Most Distinguished Chapter Officer Team for their work this last year in finding solutions for our water issues in the SCV.
- One student was selected as a Coca-Cola Gold Scholar Winner! There were over 1700 applicants, and our student received one of the 50 awards that were given!

Ten students from COC Future Business Leaders of America medaled in competitions at the FBLA-PBL California State Business Leadership Conference held in Los Angeles on March 28-30.

- Two of the COC students qualified to represent California at the National FBLA-PBL conference to be held in Nashville June 24-July 2.
- Over 400 students from fifteen colleges and universities participated.
- Nineteen members of the COC FBLA club participated in the Business Leadership Conference.
- All members also engaged in workshops designed to help them promote entrepreneurial ideas, develop leadership skills, and prepare for productive careers.
- Students were accompanied by FBLA-PBL faculty advisors Bob Maxwell and Stan Wright.

COC Speech Team

- The **COC Speech Team** won many awards on both the regional and national level.
 - Won four medals at the 2014
 CCCFA State Tournament in
 Concord, CA The team won one gold medal, two silver medals, and two bronze medals.



- The speech team won 1st place at the PSCFA Spring Champs Speech Tournament in the Limited Entry Division at California State University Long Beach.
- The speech team took first place at th annual Pacific Southwest Collegiate Forensic Association (PSCFA) Spring Champs Speech Tournament's Limited Entry Division, in addition to three individual first-place finishes.
- The speech team won gold, silver and bronze medals and ranked 8th place in their division during the five day Phi Rho Pi National Tournament in Denver.
 - This was COC's **2nd best finish ever** at the National tournament.

Conference at CSU Long Beach

- Two veteran delegates were asked by the organizers to serve as chairs, due to their reputation for excellence.
- Was awarded "Outstanding Delegate" in the Security Council.

Conference at UC Riverside

- Only two "Committee Awards" are given, which are determined by votes of the delegates participating in the conference (65 delegates from six schools). Both awards went to COC students
- Received Outstanding Delegate award for representation of China.

Conference at UCLA (LAMUN)

- Over 200 delegates from 27 colleges/universities (including Stanford, UC Berkeley, UC San Diego and many other 4-year schools)
- Outstanding Large Delegation award (second best large delegation) went to COC!
- Twenty COC students attended eight of them won individual awards!

 Denmark to share and improve curricula, examine renewable energy policy and share best practices in the following areas:
 - ✓ solar photovoltaic and solar thermal
 - ✓ geothermal
 - ✓ energy efficiency
 - ✓ energy management
 - ✓ wind turbine technology
 - ✓ Energy Policy

- Dr. Kathy Alfano and Gabrielle Temple will travel to the CREATE Center event this month (May 2014)
- Dr. Alfano will also develop a series of papers on the German vs. United States Renewable Energy Education.
- All told, our current NSF CREATE grant, including 2 supplements is approximately \$3.5 million.

Distance Learning

- **Expanded** the use of Open Educational Resources, so that open textbooks are now saving students over \$500,000 in textbook costs per year
- Hosted a visit of university faculty and administrators from North Africa and the Middle East, as part of a US
 Department of State sponsored tour of the US to learn about Open Educational Resources. COC was the only
 community college to participate in the exchange; other stops on the tour included Stanford and MIT.
- Successfully applied for renewal of the Distance Education Captioning and Transcription grant, a \$2.5 million grant from the CCC Chancellor's Office
- **Developed** an online orientation for prospective PAL students.
- **Provided** over **30 workshops** on topics related to distance education and accreditation, technology tools for online teaching, Blackboard, and more.
- Partnered with the Canyon Country Campus in the development of the new Weekend College program.
- **Provided** a complete **overhaul** of the design and content of our **website**, providing the most timely and accurate information for our students and faculty.
- Supported the TLC in the development of online tutoring solutions for students taking online classes.
- Recently received an ASG grant to help us host Open House events to showcase online and accelerated learning programs for our students.
- Authored a substantive change proposal for the ACCJC reflecting the growth of our online offerings.
- Elected chair of the California Community College Online Education Initiative steering committee.
- Founded the California Community College Distance Education Coordinators Organization, a nonprofit corporation representing coordinators and leaders in distance education throughout the state.
- **Invited** to **present online workshop** entitled "Classroom of the Future" to the Pennsylvania State System of Higher Education.

Center for Early Childhood Education

Early Childhood Education – Curriculum Alignment Project (CAP)

- The California Community Colleges Curriculum Alignment Project has engaged faculty from across the state to develop a lower-division program of study supporting early care and education teacher preparation.
- The Lower Division 8 represents evidence-based courses that are intended to become a foundational core for all early care and education professionals.
- 101 Community College in California have agreed to participate in CAP.
- 78 are officially aligned, 5 are provisionally aligned, and 2 are in the revision process to align their courses.
- We were officially aligned in March 2014.
- We will now be working on the CAP Expansion Alignment that includes a specialization in Infant/Toddler, Special Ed. and Administration.

- Through a Department of Commerce (DOC) grant we purchased fluorescent, and digital microscopes for the Biological Sciences Department.
- Shared the images with the college and community through an art exhibit designed to alter people's perspective of the microscopic world around them.
- The project exposed viewers to the unexpected beauty of the world around them that is invisible to the naked eye.

New Works Festival

- Hosted the California Council of Gerontology and Geriatrics 33rd Annual Meeting.
- Collaborated on a series of grants involving CSU Sacramento, College of the Canyons, Sacramento City College, and California Council of Gerontology and Geriatrics.
 - Hosted Day-long *GERO Boot Camp* presented SHARP students with important career strategies and techniques to enter the field of aging

Math, Science & Engineering

- Hosted the largest Speakers Symposium Series to date, featuring 7 speakers that included a statistician from Google as well as topics featuring NASA's Dawn mission, bats' tales, special relativity, bacterial methane oxidation in the deep ocean, forensics, and the nanoscale world in science, engineering, and medicine
- Worked with our Chemistry Department and Valencia High School's inaugural Nanoscience class to give high school students an opportunity to work with emerging nanotechnology equipment obtained by the College with support from the Department of Commerce.
- Premiered with MESA STEM Week, exposing our students to research and industry experts, culminating in an industry field trip at the end of the week celebration

Math, Science & Engineering – cont'd

- Continued with our second year of the Upward Bound Program and Summer Academy, where students had the opportunity to participate in a leadership conference for the first time, and 100% of this year's graduating seniors will be attending college
- Created Associate Degrees for Transfer in the areas of Geology and Computer Science as per SB 1440
- Reached out through the Elementary School Science Initiative to the Sulphur Springs District and Santa Clarita Valley International through the order of physics and electronics equipment, delivered to local 4th and 5th grade classrooms, along with teaching assistance provided by our trained MESA students

P.E./Kinesiology: Sports Medicine

- On April 30th the Sports Medicine Program hosted its first annual Open House. We invited local high school students and parents to tour our facilities and learn more about how our program helps students achieve their educational and career goals. It was a great first event that received a lot of positive feedback from students, parents and administrators.
- Our **Sports Medicine Club** participated in the **Bailey Anaheim Games** again, competing against 8 other schools, both 4 year universities and other community colleges, and performed very well. They also volunteered to help at 2 different local high school sports medicine events.
- 7 of our students were accepted to 4-year ATEP programs, a record for our small program of only about 20-30 students involved each year. The schools they are transferring to are CSUN, Fresno State, Cal State Long Beach and Metropolitan State University in Colorado. The reputation of our sports medicine program is growing!



- Starting Fall 2014, new state regulations will give Priority Registration to first-time students who have completed ALL steps of the mandatory matriculation process by June 30, 2014

- Students may begin this process starting January 1, 2014
- Fall 2014 registration dates are assigned July 1, 2014




Student Equity Plan Summit Held

- Districts shall conduct a self-evaluation on their own improvement
- In 2002, the BOG adopted the recommendations of the Task Force on Equity and Diversity to implement title 5 regulations requiring colleges
- In January of 2014, the governor's 2014-15 budget proposed to target \$100 million of additional Student Success and Support Program (SSSP) funding to close achievement gaps in access and success in underrepresented student groups, as identified in local student equity plans.
- If the legislature approves the governor's proposed budget in June of 2014, the Chancellor's Office will be charged with developing a process for allocating targeted funding to districts and colleges.
- SB 1456 requires colleges to coordinate the development of the Student Success and Support Program (SSSP) Plan with the Student Equity Plan to ensure that each college has identified strategies to address and monitor equity issues as well as attempt to mitigate any disproportionate impact on student access and achievement.
- Plans are due to the CCCCO on November 21, 2014.






K-6 Science Initiative

Grants Expand Our Revenue Base

- Expanded our revenue and continued to innovate through awards from public and private entities fund innovation, and enable the college to bring additional services online for students and the community.
- This year saw \$6.0 million in grant funding— a significant infusion that jumpstarted new initiatives.
- The following is a brief overview of significant grants awarded or launched in 2013-14.
 - Advanced Automated Manufacturing Program (National Science Foundation) COC will create a new instructional program to train students in automated manufacturing, which includes electronics, automated and laser welding, and robotics. The grant will fund curriculum development, class supplies, and state-of-the-art equipment. Award: \$664,942
 - Small Business Development Center (U.S. Small Business Administration) A new award in 2012-13 enables the college to continue offering its successful and sought-after small businesses services. The grant funds services for small businesses (500 employees or less) and start-ups, including workshops, business plan assistance, investor information and counseling. Award: \$317,000

Significant grants awarded or launched in 2013-14, continued

- Doing What Matters Regional Coordinators (California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office) – College of the Canyons will lead regional consortiums in developing workforce training initiatives in Allied Health, Manufacturing, and Information and Communication Technologies/Digital Media. Three individual awards of \$300,000 are part of the Chancellor's Office Doing What Matters for the Economy initiative, which is focused on enhancing the statewide growth of key industry sectors in California. Award: \$900,000
- Alternative Energy Faculty Exchange (National Science Foundation) Following a successful faculty exchange program in Australia, the National Science Foundation asked COC to develop a similar program for 15 faculty members to travel to Germany. Their focus will be developing curriculum to train technicians in renewable energy disciplines including solar photovoltaic, solar thermal, biofuels, geothermal, energy efficiency, energy management, and wind turbine technology. Award: \$248,538

Significant grants awarded or launched in 2013-14, cont'd

- Received another 5 year renewal of being the Fiscal Agent for the Statewide Distance Education Captioning & Transcription (DECT) project at \$500,000 per year
- Awarded an additional 3-year National Science Foundation grant totaling \$664,942 entitled "Advanced, Automated Manufacturing and Processing Technicians Program" to support the expansion of our welding program
- SB 1070 Regional Coordinator grant to plan and coordinate Career Technical Education activities (working with the DSNs) across the South Central Region totaling \$1,294,215 over 3 years.








History Of State Apportionment Funding – Cuts To Coc Base Funding Since 2009-10 A Snapshot And Review

California Community College System 2014-2015 Governor's May Revise Budget

The 2014-15 Governor's May Revise Budget proposal continues to be very positive for the Community College System. But with 2013-2014 revenue growth not expected to carry into 2014-2015, the Governor sees a complicated picture for the State budget.

Proposition 98 Guarantee Decreases 2013-2014 to 2014-2015

- \$592.4 M Elimination of Deferrals: One-Time and On-Going Funding
 - ✓ All Apportionment deferrals will be eliminated in 2014-2015
- \$140.4 M 2.75% Access (\$172.6 M Left to Restore to Pre-Recession Levels)
 - ✓ \$1,849,724 Projected District Funding
 - ✓ Basic Skills, Remedial Education, Workforce Development, Transfer

California Community College System 2014-2015 Governor's May Revise Budget – cont'd

Governor's Concerns

- Will emphasize the need for fiscal restraint despite calls for greater spending and restoration of general fund programs negatively impacted during the Great Recession
- Will propose a ballot measure to modify a proposed Rainy Day Fund that will smooth out the State's "boom and bust" budget cycles (fueled primarily by capital gains returns) and require the State to pay down liabilities.
- ✓ STRS obligations will also have a proposed solution to increase contributions from the State, employers and employees to fully fund the \$74 B liability.



COLLEGE OF THE CANYONS' FINANCIAL IMPACT IN THE COMMUNITY

Economic Impact Report

- The regional economic impact analysis examines the impact of COC on the local business community through increased consumer spending and enhanced business productivity.
- Results are measure in terms of added income and are organized according to the following three effects:
- Impact of college operations
- Impact of the spending of students who relocated to the region, and;
- Impact of the increased productivity of former students that were employed in the regional workforce during the analysis year.

Economic Impact Report

- Total Impact
 - The overall effect of COC on the local business community during the analysis year amounted to \$251.9 million, equal to the sum of the college operations effect, the student spending effect and the student productivity effect.
 - This added income was equal to approximately 2.2% of the region's Gross Regional Product.


