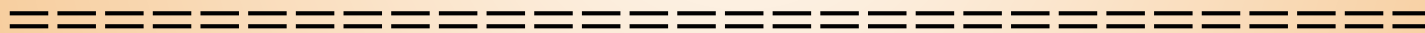

▶ **California Dream Application (CADAA)** – allows students with no social security number and nonresident students who qualify for a non-resident exemption under Assembly Bill 540 (AB 540) to receive certain types of financial aid such as: private scholarships, state financial aid, university grants, community college fee waivers, and Cal Grants.

❖ To be considered for a Cal Grant award, a completed financial aid application and a certified Grade Point Average (GPA) must be submitted by the **March 2 deadline** and available **October 1st**

❖ You must set up a WebGrants 4 Students account to manage your Cal Grant at:

The California Student Aid Commission (CSAC) will process this application. Any aid offered can only be used at eligible California institutions. The information on this form will be used to determine eligibility in the Cal Grant program. Ask your college whether they will be using this application for financial aid programs other than the Cal Grant program. The California Dream Act Application can be completed online at www.caldreamact.org.

The California Dream Act Application is not an application for federal financial aid. Students eligible to file the Free Application for Federal Student Aid (FAFSA), must use that application which is available online at www.fafsa.gov. **Students should not complete both applications.**

DEPARTMENT OF HOMELAND SECURITY ET AL. v. REGENTS OF THE UNIVERSITY OF CALIFORNIA ET AL., 591 U. S. ____ (2020), (June 18, 2020)

Background

Holding: U.S. Supreme Court ruled that DHS's decision to rescind the Deferred Action for Childhood Arrivals (DACA) program was arbitrary and capricious under the Administrative Procedures Act.

Impact of the Supreme Court Decision on DACA Filings:
Under the SCOTUS decision, USCIS must continue to process the following types of DACA requests (as outlined USCIS guidance in place prior to the Supreme Court ruling):

People Who Currently Have DACA:

Current DACA recipients can file a renewal DACA request.

People Whose DACA Expired One Year Ago or Less:

Recipients whose previous DACA expired one year ago or less may still file a renewal DACA request.

People Whose DACA Expired More Than One Year Ago:

Recipients whose previous DACA expired more than one year ago cannot file a renewal DACA request but may file an initial DACA request.

People Whose DACA Was Terminated:

DACA recipients whose previous DACA was terminated at any point cannot request DACA as a renewal but may file an initial DACA request.

Key Findings:

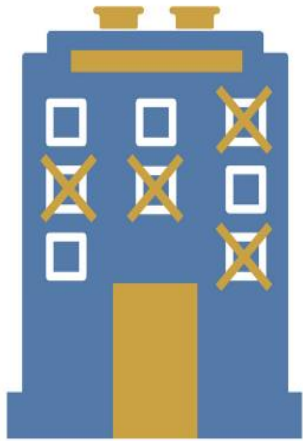
- Discomfort when disclosing immigration status and frequently encounter staff who are unaware of undocumented student resources
- Students and staff alike depend on undocumented student services staff members to provide resources and social support to undocumented students



Health & Well-Being



Undocumented students face high financial insecurity.



46%
of UC undocumented students
reported difficulty paying rent.



Undocumented students experience immigration-related distractions that hurt their academic performance.



Health & Well-Being



Undocumented students have limited access to post-graduate preparation.

44%

of UC undocumented students had participated in a professional development opportunity.



30%

felt prepared to achieve their career goals after graduation.

Undocumented students report high levels of stress and need inclusive mental health services.

64%

of UC undocumented students reported needing mental health services.



Of these,
only 2 in 5
sought professional help.



Risks and Benefits of Coming Out

Impact of Activism on DACAmented Latinas/os/xs

Impetus for “coming out”:

- Need to disclose in order to access resources
- DACA’s emboldening effect
- Increased awareness of status-related oppression
- Academic resilience as a result of their 1.5 generation status

Benefits of Activism:

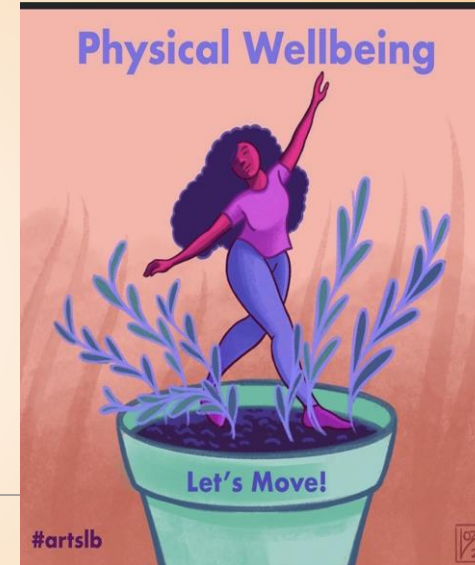
- Strong network of undocumented and undocu-friendly allies
- Sense of empowerment
- Leadership skills

Benefits outweighed the costs of activism, including:

- Increased deportation risk
- Advocacy “burnout”
- Elitism within activist communities
- Policies excluding other undocumented immigrants

How Can I Tell if my Service Provider is an Ally?

- ◆ You feel HEARD.
- ◆ You were not forced to disclose your status.
- ◆ You were acknowledged for the courage it took to ask for support.
- ◆ Your experiences of oppression, education inequity, etc. were acknowledged and validated.
- ◆ You were encouraged to connect with other Undocu-friendly support services to get the specialized care you deserve.
- ◆ You were referred to appropriate support systems.
- ◆ You feel they make an effort to stay informed and continue to seek training.



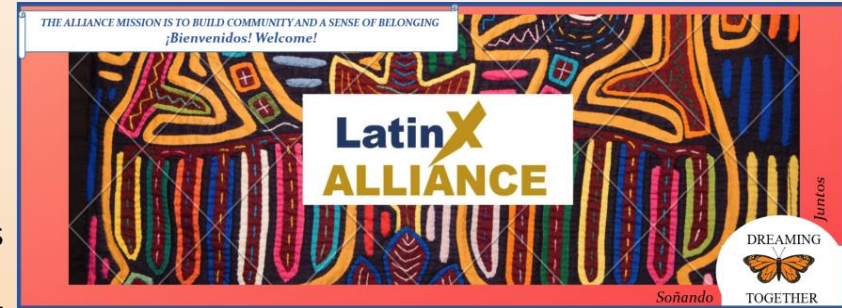
Mentors & Social Support
