- 3. Conversation with Campus Colleagues Supporting Student Recruitment, Retention and Success
 - Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, Anti-Racism and Accessibility (IDEAA) Repository (Dr. Alene Terzian-Zeitounian)
 - The IDEAA emerged during a convocation session. A faculty member suggested
 that it would be nice to have a space where we can have different resources
 that we could go to and pull from, in order to make their teaching more
 culturally responsive.



- The IDEAA group consists of Alene Terzian-Zetounian, Julie Johnson, Pamela Williams-Paez, Katie Coleman and Brittany Applen.
- IDEAA started as a project for faculty, and it is now evolved into something bigger, because now we've noticed that what we've created can be accessed by students, staff, administrators and anyone who wants to be more versed in some of these areas of focus when dealing with: inclusivity, diversity, equity, accessibility, and anti-racism.
- Pebble Pad is where all of the ideas are stored. It is a living document and we
 are still adding more information. On the main page, you will find the
 description, definition and topics. Each section- Inclusion, Diversity, Equity,
 Accessibility and Antiracism- consists with definition, articles, video clips, quick
 bytes, video resources and discussion questions. These are things you can put
 into your syllabus teaching philosophy statements of support.
- We are hoping IDEAA can be a tool that can be used on campus for decades to come.



- Alliances (Erin Delaney, Trans Alliance and Anthony Morris, Black Student Alliance)
 - o What is Trans Alliance?
 - Affinity group for students who are transgender, non-binary, or questioning their gender identity
 - Provide academic and social support for navigating the college experience
 - ➤ 15-20 students that meet regularly; ~70 on Discord
 - Student led, faculty administered
 - Meetings include:
 - Support group style topics, such as parental acceptance or trans joy
 - Discussion of national/global events, especially as they relate to trans individuals
 - Discussion of strategies for success in college and beyond
 - Guest speakers

 - o Tutoring for Justice-Impacted Students
 - Tutoring for English 101 & 103, Geography 101, Math 100, Coms 120, History 111 & Psychology 101
 - ➤ Life Skill Workshops
 - Survey Results
 - Student Feedback
 - > Future Expectations
 - Embedded Tutoring
 - > Tutors are dedicated to specific faculty members
 - ➤ Highly customizable to make sure the needs of each class are met
 - > They attend class and are included on the Canvas shell
 - Tutors can assist with:
 - Providing feedback (not grades) to students
 - ➤ Holding workshops or study jams
 - Holding office hours
 - Both faculty and tutors receive training
 - Faculty: 1-hour training on best practices
 - Tutors: Training on tutoring practices, maintaining boundaries, and FERPA regulations



- In addition, the faculty provide individualized training and mentorship to tutors
- ➤ This semester, 23 sections of English are supported by embedded tutors
- Workshops in Multiple Formats
 - Robust workshop schedule to support student learning (10-15 workshops per week)
 - Workshops offered online, at Valencia, and at Canyon Country
 - Variety of formats and lengths
 - > Topics:
 - Reading, Writing, and Study Skills
 - Communications
 - Specialty Topics, including pop culture and creative writing
- Native American Student Success and Support Program (Laurie Solis)
 - NASSSP is a California state funded program to assist Native American/American
 Indian/Alaskan Native students in completing their educational goals
 - Our native community:
 - California number of tribes: 110 fed recognized, 81 seeking fed recognition. Our state has the highest population of American Indians (757, 628) Los Angeles county has the highest population at 1,346,865 which is 3rd behind the "White" population
 - ➤ There are 408 COC students that are American Indian and 342 are enrolled in NASSSP
 - COC's NASSSP Native Pathways
 - > Financial aid
 - All NASSSP students immediately get a voucher to the bookstore for textbooks and supplies
 - In Spring 2024, we dispersed \$3,620.20
 - We distributed hundreds of dollars in Canvas bags, pens, folders and flash drives to students
 - Have \$3000 in monetary subsidy cards that students can receive
 - ER stipends are available
 - We've also dispersed hundreds of personal health kits via United American Indian Involvement, Inc. (UAII)

Marginalization



The AIAN community is often underrepresented in sample data. Further, identity is often misclassified



Discrepancy in results warrants an examination of the underrepresentation of the AIAN population across sources for data available in Los Angeles County



Historical underrepresentation and misclassification are problematic in that it ignores the unique challenges of this population and may divert resources and services that are required to address the specific needs of the population

17% of AIAN Veteran respondents reported receiving Veteran's medical benefits compared to approximately 11% of all unsheltered Veterans.

 No AIAN unsheltered veterans reported receiving any form of Veteran's Disability (compared to 8% of all unsheltered Veterans).

Today, there are more than **24,000** American Indian and Alaskan Native men and women on active duty, and more than 183,000 veterans identify as American Indian or Alaska Native.

- The American Indian/Native American Community has more volunteers in the military than any other group of people. Since 9/11, the rate of Native Americans serving is the highest of any groups, with nearly 19 percent joining the military.
- AI/NA also experiences the most injuries and casualties since they volunteer for the most dangerous missions.

- Undocumented Resource Center (Melody Klingenfuss)
 - The Undocumented Resource Center is a welcoming resource center for undocumented students, regardless of DACA, AB540/2000, SB68, TPS, out-ofstatus, and immigrant students
 - Foster community
 - Provide holistic resources, programming, and services
 - > Support personal, academic, and career goals
 - We estimate about 200-275 undocumented students at COC
 - California has the largest population of undocumented college students, roughly 83,000 people, according to one estimate using data from the American Communities Survey
 - o 27,000 undocumented students graduate California high schools every year
 - o Just 10% of undocumented students pursue higher education
 - o Only 155 of California DREAM Act applicants receive financial aid
 - History: The URC was established in 2021, under the umbrella of the empowerment programs. The URC's mission is to provide a safe, supportive, and social justice space for all undocumented students regardless of status. As of 2023 the URC is housed in the Intercultural Centers at the Valencia and Canyon Country Campuses. Both centers will work closely together to support all students of the District.
 - Our services include:
 - > Free legal assistance
 - Academic support and educational counseling
 - > Transportation and food subsidies
 - > Financial aid support
 - Mental health and wellness Resources
 - On-and-off campus referrals
 - Career and major exploration
 - > Transfer support process
 - Volunteering opportunities
 - Grab and go food as well as BANC referrals
 - o Our Vision 2024
 - > Student Empowerment, Recruitment, and Retention: Support students personally, professionally, and academically while fostering community at COC.
 - Campus and Community Outreach: Cultivate meaningful collaborations with COC staff, faculty, departments as well as outside entities such as high schools and organizations
 - Visibility for URC and Undocumented Students' Experiences: Develop a robust and comprehensive training curriculum for COC staff and faculty



The Undocumented Population*


11.2 million Undocumented immigrants of all ages living in the United States
 2.1 million Undocumented students in the United States potentially eligible for most recently proposed federal DREAM Act (S. 729 in the 111th Congress)
 1.1 million Undocumented children under the age of 18 living in the United States
 65,000 Undocumented students who have lived in the United States for five or more years graduating from high school each year

7,000 - 13,000 Undocumented students enrolled in college throughout the United States
