

## 2025 – 2026 California General Education Transfer Curriculum

GE Area	Completion of all the requirements in the California General Education Transfer Curriculum (Cal-GETC) will permit a student to transfer from a community college to a campus in either the California State University or University of California system without the need after transfer to take additional lower-division general education courses. The course requirements for all areas must be completed before the Cal-GETC can be certified. All courses must be completed with grades of "C" or better ("C-" grades are <u>not</u> acceptable). Common Course Numbering (CCN)	
California Assembly Bill 1111, or AB 1111, also known as the "Common Course Numbering" bill, aims to simplify the transfer process for students within the California Community Colleges (CCC) system. The bill requires that CCC courses satisfying similar requirements—like general education or major requirements—share the same course number across all CCC. This standardization helps students more easily identify transferable courses. The course renumbering will be implemented in phases, allowing time for institutions to align courses gradually. Below are the current implemented CCNs:

# Frequently Asked Questions

## WHO SHOULD COMPLETE Cal-GETC?

Cal-GETC is most helpful to students who know they want to transfer but want to keep their options open and have not chosen a particular major or institution.

Cal-GETC is inappropriate for students transferring into a major requiring extensive lower-division preparation, such as most high-unit engineering or science majors at any UC campus. This recommendation does not preclude a student from following the Cal-GETC. Still, the Cal-GETC should not be chosen to the exclusion of completing any major preparatory courses needed for admission. Cal-GETC may be inappropriate for some UC campus majors (Consult a counselor for details.)

**WHAT IS Cal-GETC?** The California General Education Transfer Curriculum (Cal-GETC) is the singular general education pathway for California Community College (CCC) students to fulfill lower-division general education requirements necessary for transfer and admission to both the California State University (CSU) and the University of California (UC).

**WHAT IS Cal-GETC CERTIFICATION?** When you are certified to complete the Cal-GETC, you are guaranteed that you do not need to take any additional lower-division courses to satisfy the general education requirements at UC or CSU.

**HOW DO I COMPLETE THE Cal-GETC?** If you follow the Cal-GETC, you must complete all courses with a “C” or better (C- grades are unacceptable). The requirements consist of a specified number of courses and units from the English, Mathematics, Arts & Humanities, Social and Behavioral Science, Ethnic Studies, and Physical and Biological Sciences subject areas, plus:

- If you plan to transfer to the UC, you must fulfill a foreign language proficiency.
- If you plan to transfer to the CSU, you should also fulfill the American Institutions requirements.

**IS Cal-GETC REQUIRED FOR ADMISSION?** No. Cal-GETC is not an admissions requirement. Completing it is not required nor guarantees admission to the campus or program of choice. Students must complete a minimum of 60 UC units to transfer to UC or 60 CSU units to transfer to a CSU campus, as well as the minimum CSU and UC subject and GPA requirements. See a COC counselor if you have questions about these minimum admission requirements.

**MUST I COMPLETE ALL OF Cal-GETC TO BE CERTIFIED?** Yes. Students transferring using the Cal-GETC pattern may receive only full certification.

Students transferring using the IGETC or CSU GE Breadth pattern may continue receiving full or partial certification based on their catalog rights.

**WHEN AND HOW DO I CERTIFY THE Cal-GETC?** The student should request **certification** before transferring. You must complete a transcript request via MyCanyons or Admissions & Records. When certification is requested, it must be noted whether CSU IGETC, UC IGETC, or Cal-GETC certification is needed. The certification will be noted on your final transcript sent to the transferring institution. Certification is the responsibility of the last California community college attended before transfer.

**IS THERE A GPA REQUIREMENT?** Cal-GETC courses must be completed with a grade of “C” or better (C- grades are unacceptable). Pass/No Pass courses are acceptable up to 14 units only if the college catalog defines credit as equivalent to a letter grade of “C” or better and only if the courses are not required for the major.

## CAN I USE MY ADVANCED PLACEMENT SCORES TO SATISFY THE Cal-GETC AREAS?

Yes, a score of 3 or higher can satisfy any Cal-GETC subject area except Critical Thinking and Oral Communication. Each AP exam may be applied to one Cal-GETC area as satisfying one course requirement, except for Language Other Than English (LOTE). An acceptable AP score for Cal-GETC equates to 3 semester or 4 quarter units for certification purposes. AP credit is also evaluated independently by each campus. Their evaluation will not impact Cal-GETC applicability but does affect credit at the transfer institution. To determine how AP credit is awarded at College of the Canyons, refer to the current college catalog & Counseling website.

**HOW ARE COURSES APPLIED?** Courses may be used only once to satisfy one Cal-GETC subject area, even if they are listed in the course agreement under more than one subject area. However, courses may be used to satisfy Cal-GETC and major requirements. The only exception is that an advanced foreign language course that satisfies Area 3B – Humanities may also be used to clear the Language Other than English requirement.

## I TOOK A CLASS LISTED BEFORE Cal-GETC WAS APPROVED; WILL IT STILL COUNT?

Yes, if the course was approved for IGETC the year you took it, it will count for Cal-GETC credit. However, each student should consult the Counseling Office each year for revisions to the Cal-GETC pattern.

## I HAVE TAKEN COURSES AT OTHER CALIFORNIA COMMUNITY COLLEGES; WILL THEY COUNT TOWARD Cal-GETC?

All Cal-GETC coursework does not have to be completed at the same college. Courses completed at any accredited college can be used. However, coursework from other institutions will be applied in the Cal-GETC category determined by the *original* California community college, per the [www.ASSIST.org](http://www.ASSIST.org) website.

## I HAVE TAKEN COURSES AT A CSU, UC, INDEPENDENT, OR OUT-OF-STATE COLLEGE. WILL THEY COUNT TOWARD Cal-GETC?

Cal-GETC can be certified for transfers who have also completed transfer units at a CSU, UC, independent, or out-of-state college. Coursework from other UC, CSU, independent, and out-of-state colleges will be applied in the appropriate Cal-GETC category as referenced in the Cal-GETC standards.

Students who initially enroll at a UC campus, then leave and attend a community college, and then return to the same campus are considered “readmits” by the University and cannot use Cal-GETC.

## I HAVE INTERNATIONAL COURSEWORK; WILL IT COUNT TOWARD Cal-GETC?

International coursework may be applied to Cal-GETC if the international institution has United States accreditation from ICAS-approved accreditors (See Cal-GETC standards for a list). All other international coursework cannot be applied to Cal-GETC. Students with a substantial amount of international coursework at a non-United States regionally accredited institution should be encouraged to follow the CSU GE or campus-specific UC GE patterns.

## I TOOK TWO YEARS OF A FOREIGN LANGUAGE IN HIGH SCHOOL; WILL THAT COUNT TOWARD LOTE?

Yes, verification will be based on transcripts from the high school indicating completion with a grade of “C-” or better of coursework equivalent to two years in high school of the same foreign language.

## ENGLISH IS MY SECOND LANGUAGE; DO I HAVE TO TAKE A FOREIGN LANGUAGE HERE?

Maybe. The language requirement may be met if the student has completed two years of formal schooling at the sixth-grade level or higher in an institution where the language of instruction is not English. If the secondary schooling was completed in a non-English speaking country and the language of instruction of the secondary school was not English, the language other than English can be certified for Cal-GETC. The student must provide documentation to verify the required courses. See a counselor for other ways to meet the Language Other Than English requirement.
