

COC Distinguishes Itself Through Its Outstanding Achievements

We Are Consistently Among the Best!

COC....

- Ranks among the top 20 among the 116 California Community Colleges with transfers to UCs and CSUs.
- Saw an 80% increase in AA/AS graduates as a result of allowing students to bypass remedial classes in English and math.
- Named a 2023 Champion for Excelling in Equitable Course Placement in Campus-wide English Enrollment, Latinx English Enrollment, and Black English Enrollment. COC was one of 116 colleges to be named.
- Earned the distinction of being included in the group of **850** of *America's Best Colleges for Student Voting* for its commitment to inspiring students to vote and participate in civic engagement.

Nursing Program Receives NLN-CNEA Accreditation

Following a successful Board of Registered Nursing (BRN) and Commission for Nursing Education Accreditation (CNEA) site visit, the nursing department has received reaffirmed accreditation from the NLN-CNEA.



The program has achieved an impressive **94.23%** pass rate in the spring 2023 for the National Council Licensure Examination.



Faculty Member Receives Top Honor

Patty Robinson, along with colleague, Kimberly Rosenfeld from Cerritos College, gave a presentation on Hidden Stewards of Democracy: Untapping the Strength of California's Community Colleges to Advance Civic Equity Among the Nation's Most Marginalized Students at this year's American Association of Colleges and Universities (AAC&C) Annual Meting, Jan. 17th-19th in Washington DC.

- Patty and Kimberly focused on the critical need for the nation's community colleges, especially California's community colleges, to return to their "civic mission" and to advance the principles of democracy through practices of liberal education.
- Practices accessible through transfer, career education, and co-curricular activities found throughout higher education.



COC Administrator and Faculty Receive Stanford Fellowships

Dr. Jia-Yi Cheng-Levine and **Dr. Saburo Matsumoto** are Fellows in the 2023-24 Stanford EPOC Community College Leaders and Faculty Fellowship program.

- The *Education Partnership for Internationalizing Curriculum (EPIC)* programs bring together a cohort of community college faculty and administrative leaders to work collaboratively with Stanford staff for **one academic year** (August 2023 May 2024) on self-designed projects aimed at internationalizing core curricula and developing global competencies among community college students.
- It's a competitive process. For each year's fellowship, Stanford accepts only **10** for the Faculty Cohort (Dr. Matsumoto) and **6** for the Leaders Cohort (Dr. Cheng-Levine).
- Fellows attend a three-day intensive workshop at Stanford in early August, 2023; participate in monthly virtual seminars, develop a project, and present their project outcomes at the end-of-the-year symposium in May 2024.





Students Compete at Conference



Eighteen College of the Canyons students competed at a statewide *Future Business Leaders of America (FBLA) leadership conference* the weekend of **Nov. 11**th **and 12**th, with **Christopher Bordbar** taking **first place** in the business pitch competition, which shared a format similar to that of the TV show "Shark Tank." Students from across the state participated in the FBLA California Fall State Business Leadership Conference at California State University, Long Beach.

40 Under Forty Honorees

We congratulated this year's **40 Under 40** honorees from College of the Canyons – **Vida Manzo** from Institutional Development and our very own Executive Assistant to the Board of Trustees, **Marilu Ramirez** from the Chancellor's Office at a special awards ceremony on **Thursday, Nov. 30**th **at Blomgren Ranch**.





Renard Thomas Honored

Renard Thomas, director of the Veterans Resource Center, was honored during Single Mothers Outreach's *Empowering Hearts Gala* on Friday, Feb. 23rd.

- Thomas and five fellow honorees had their stories shared in the form of a unique piece of art created by a local artist.
- Upon meeting and engaging with their paired honoree, each artist designed an appropriate composition in their field of artistic expertise.

COC Sets the Standard in Pioneering New Programs

ADTs Provide Students with Pathways to Higher Education

Out of the **99** Associate Degrees offered at COC, **32** are transferable to CSUs – ADTs.

- Most recently the Law, Public Policy, and Society AA-T degree was approved.
- COC ranks in the top third of community colleges in the state in the number of ADTs offered.
- In addition to Associate Degrees, COC offers 103 credit work force training certificates, and 78 Noncredit Certificates.



We Have Expanded Opportunities with New Courses

The Noncredit Curriculum Committee has approved **16** new courses and **7** certificates to date.

As of July, 1 2023, the college's Curriculum Committee has approved **37** new credit courses in **6** disciplines.

Exchange programs


- 1:1 student exchange with partner schools abroad

- Transfer to a University abroad to complete a Bachelor's degree, some with reduced tuition
- Transfer university decides on credit transfer
- FAFSA-eligible universities available





Introducing the New Improved Hospitality Management Program

The Culinary Arts program has taken on the Hotel Restaurant Management program and rebranded it as **Hospitality Management.**

- This rebranding makes the new program more relevant in today's workforce.
- Placing the Hospitality program under the umbrella of culinary arts enhances the relevance of the program and gives students an advantage in the workplace.



New Health Professions Programs Prepare Students for High Demand Careers

COC is excited to launch our upcoming Health Professions programs which strategically align with the college's mission to be innovative, inclusive, and collaborative with our community's needs.

The Health Professions school has successfully recruited faculty members for all our new programs, which encompasses the:

- Physical Therapy Assistant program (24 technical courses).
- Pharmacy Technician program (scheduled to launch Spring 2025).
- Diagnostic Medical Sonography program (scheduled to launch Fall 2025).
- Occupational Therapy Assistant program (scheduled to launch Fall 2025).



TK Pathway for Teachers

In response to the significant demand for **Transitional Kindergarten (TK)** teachers, COC now offers an additional pathway for currently credentialed teachers to earn the **24** *Early* **Childhood Education (ECE)** units required to teach TK.

- The growing need for TK teachers is the result of state legislation that is gradually expanding TK over a four-year period.
- With more than 300,000 students expected to enroll in TK, school districts will need to hire up to 15,600 additional lead TK teachers to meet demand, according to the Learning Policy Institute.
- Originally offered as an accelerated 10-month pathway in 2022-23, this pathway will allow teachers to complete the pathway's nine courses, one at time, in a fully online format, from fall, 2023 through spring, 2025.





Engaging our Senior Community - The Canyons Emeritus and Lifelong Learning Opportunities Program (CELLO)

This program will focus on comprehensive older adults programming and ways to involve seniors in our campus community, including:

- Non-credit courses computers, art, ancestry, crafts, exercise (tap, square dancing), conversational language classes.
- Community Education museums, gardens, Griffith Park, Rose Bowl, Hearst Castle, etc.
- Retired Senior Volunteer Program (RSVP), events and project work, tutoring, graduation.
- Foundation Group/Clubs book clubs, dinner night, movie nights (film series), dances.
- **Senior speaker series** to enhance existing Belcaro, Friendly Valley programs, podcasts, guest speakers in history classes.
- **Engagement** Choral group, art shows, make blankets for the BANC, crafters/holiday boutique, senior astronomy club.
- Mentoring Pairing an experienced professional with a COC student in their major.

COC Demonstrates its Dedication to Driving Positive Change Through Innovation

National Science Foundation Award

COC received a \$500,000 National Science Foundation (NSF) award to support underrepresented college students in native bee research, community education and engagement, and habitat patch and corridor creation.

- Builds on existing RCN-UBE Incubator project by providing five years of funding for The BUZZ: Engaging Community College Students in Native Bee Biodiversity Research.
- Only 8-12 projects nationally receive funding at this level each year!
- Our Goal Provide research experience to hundreds of students through mentoring and course-based research AND increase biodiversity through habitat creation and enrichment.

Grant Supports Native Americans

College of the Canyons has been awarded a \$1.5 million grant from the California Community Colleges Chancellor's Office to fund a Native American Student Support and Success Program.

- The five-year grant will allow the college to provide support for the educational success of Native American students and strengthen K–12 pathways to and through the California Community College system, including student transfer to the University of California and the California State University systems.
- The grant will also help students connect with Native American mentors to empower and develop leadership skills.
- Currently, the college has a Native American and Indigenous Alliance
 that helps Native American students navigate college, connect with
 mentors, meet with counselors and financial aid advisors, and discuss
 issues in a safe and welcoming space.





Grants Development Supports Innovation



College of the Canyons has opened a **14,000** sq. ft. interim Advanced Technology Center (ATC) to provide a world-class advanced manufacturing and technology facility to help meet the demand for skilled technicians in the Santa Clarita Valley and Greater Los Angeles area.

The ATC provides the educational and handson training that leads to obtainment of industry recognized credentials needed for employment in today's Industry 4.0 aligned high-demand, high-skill, high-wage jobs.



COC Supports Student Success and Completion through Guided Pathways

Guided Pathways Enhances Student Success and Improves Outcomes

In 2017, the California Community Colleges began implementing the Guided Pathways framework. This initiative is a statewide effort aimed at transforming the student experience and improving educational outcomes within the CCC system.

Some key components of Guided Pathways include:

- Development of clearly defined program pathways that map out the courses and milestones students need to complete to achieve their academic and career goals.
- Integration of support services (academic advising, counseling, tutoring, and career services).
- Student access to timely and relevant information about academic programs, career options, transfer opportunities, and financial aid.
- Prioritization of equity and inclusion by addressing disparities in access, retention, and completion strategies among underserved student populations that promote equity, diversity, and inclusion.
- · Utilization of data to inform decision-making and drive improvement efforts.

What's Next...



- Increase use of Canyons Connects among faculty and support areas to connect students to support services and resources on campus to ensure their success.
- Focus on currency/accuracy of Program Maps update maps to reflect CalGETC requirements and changes made through the Curriculum and SLO processes. As of today, 90% of maps are current (322 out of 355)!
- Launch new Program Maps in Program Mapper (15 in the queue already for 2024/25)!
- Promote the IDEAA Share Repository which is a repertoire of materials for instructors to support Inclusion, Diversity, Equity, Anti-Racism and Accessibility (IDEAA) strategies.
- Promote equitable success, attainment of their goals and intentionally
 maximize opportunities for all students through cross-department and constituency
 collaboration to identify strategies, events, and other activities.
- Leverage student researchers majoring in Psychology and Sociology in the IRPIE office to assist with surveys, including calling students to gather student voice to inform planning and decision-making!
- Finalize institutionalization of efforts started under Canyons Completes into existing programs and departments as State categorical support ends after this year.

Student Success Metrics

The number of students who have completed:

- Transfer-level English in their first year has increased from 15% in 2011-12 to 46% in 2021-22.
- Transfer-level math in their first year has increased from **7**% in 2011-12 to **34**% in 2021-22.

The number of students who earned degrees (AA/S or ADTs) has increased from **1,125** in 2012-13 to **2028** in 2012-13, an **80.3%** increase.

The number of students who transferred to a four-year university has increased from **2,089** in 2014-25 to **2,653** in 2020-21, a **27%** increase.

The Bottom Line – The Data Tells Us...

We have seen SUCCESSES – We increased...

- Completion rates for Transfer-Level Math and English over past 5 years
- Completion of degrees, certificates and transfers to 4-year institutions

BUT, there is still work to be done--

- We need to examine how we are set up to ensure that we're serving our part-time students well.
- African-American/Black students, First-Generation students and Latinx/Hispanic Males face disproportionate impact in completion/transfer/transfer Math & English completion.



Students Invited to 'Fuel Up'

The College of the Canyons Institute for Culinary Education provided free meals to students during its "Fuel Up" event on Thursday, Aug. 24th.

- Over 500 students were treated to a delicious Mediterranean style box lunch.
- ➤ The meals were prepared by students in the Advanced Catering class from noon to 1:30











Building Futures - COC's Student Housing Project

- In 2021, COC partnered with Scion to conduct a Student Housing Feasibility Study.
- Study findings indicated a demand for student housing by a 50% margin between what is available and what is needed.
- COC applied for a state grant to construct a 100-bed facility for qualifying students.
- On June 30, 2022, the State Budget allocated \$62,858,000 to build Affordable Student Housing.
- In October 2022, the first allocation of funds in the amount of \$23M was received.
- In May 2023, the Governor's budget included language to require individual districts to take out a bond to pay for the construction.


Canyons Promise is Growing in Leaps and Bounds!

The *Canyons Promise* program provides incoming first-time college students the opportunity to attend COC tuition-free for their first two-years; and provides students with financial support, high-touch academic/counseling support, and peer support to increase student success.

Canyons Promise has served over **5300** students and saved students over **\$5 million** since 2017. Since then, the program has expanded from serving **250** students to **over 2000** in the 2023/24 academic year!

In a 5-year study of the Canyons Promise program, students outperformed their non-Promise counterparts.

What's new with **Open Educational** Resources and Zero **Textbook Cost** pathways?

OER/ZTC by the numbers



During the academic year 2022-23

Online Ed facilitated:

- 37 projects creating or improving OER textbooks and courses
- 7 new OER textbooks authored by our faculty

Online Ed offered:

- 21 OER workshops/training sessions
- **5** OER week-long training courses

Faculty offering ZTC sections saved students millions of dollars.

What's Next for OER/ZTC?



- 2021: COC was instrumental in securing \$115M state funding for a revived state grant program.
- 2023: COC is the Technical Assistance Provider for the \$115M grant.
- 2023: Locally, COC secured \$600,000 for Land Surveying, Sustainable Architecture, and Water Technology ZTC pathways
- With a Title V grant, funding is available to support OER development in STEM

COC Empowers Prosperity through Economic Development & Workforce Training

COC Continues to Play a Pivotal Role in Growing Our Local Economy

The Workforce & Economic Advancement Division currently provides focused services in workforce development, training and entrepreneurship to **1,971** businesses and **2,379** individuals.

Other recent noteworthy accomplishments include:

- Developed new courses in Technical Writing and Cisco Certified Network Associate in partnership with Northrop Grumman.
- Currently serving as the lead institution for the South Central Coast Regional Consortium (SCCRC) Centers of Excellence grant.
- Fast Track programs achieved a 90% graduation/placement rate from our Advanced Manufacturing Program.



COC Trains Students for Aerospace Certification Program

COC has partnered with Northrop Grumman to create a training program for the application of low observable (stealth) coatings, an area of expertise that is in high demand.

Highlights of the program include:

- Our Employee Training Institute hires Northrop Grumman employees to teach the 13-week, 130-hour course.
- Four cohorts (total of **58** students) have completed the program to date.
- Fifth cohort started on February 20th.
- COC is the only community college in California to offer a training program for the application of low observable coatings.
- Graduates have the potential opportunity to be hired by Northrop Grumman.

COC's Uniquely Abled-Academy Continues to Gain Momentum

Launched in the spring of 2018, the Uniquely Abled Academy provides advanced training and support for highly functional autistic individuals to work as Computer Numeric Controlled (CNC) machinists.

- To date, the program has trained 40 students, all of whom found employment after earning a UAA certificate.
- **Fifteen** community colleges across the country have replicated our UAA CNC program.
- By 2025, **10** more colleges will have adopted our program.
- COC was recently recognized as a top-performing training provider by the South Bay Workforce Investment Board for its 100% job placement of UAA graduates.
- The UAA is set to relocate to the Advanced Technology Center in spring 2024.





ETI Receives Training Award

\$749,785 from the *California Employment Training Panel (ETP)* to provide worker training to client companies in the Santa Clarita Valley who wish to retain an up-skilled workforce through customized training programs.

- The two-year reimbursement contract will allow the college to offset the training costs charged to employers who meet the eligibility requirements set by ETP.
- This is the **17**th contract of its kind awarded to the college!
- ➤ This contract will bring the total ETP funding to more than \$9 million brought to Santa Clarita Valley employers to offset training costs.








Student Union at Valencia Campus

Construction on the modernization of the Student Center is expected to begin in Fall 2024 with a duration of 18 months. (We expect to receive DSA approval in April 2024.)

- The programs within the Student Center have expanded; the current space distribution no longer meets the current operational needs; and wayfinding has become increasingly complex throughout the building.
- The existing footprint of the building will remain the same; however the program spaces will be reorganized to meet contemporary program needs and to provide easier wayfinding for students and staff.






ADA Transition Project

Phase I of this long-term, campus wide project was completed in 2020.

Work on Phase II of the ADA Transition Plan began in late 2022. This phase is focusing on ensuring paths of travel – which includes parking, signage, walkways, stairs and ramps – comply with the Americans with Disabilities Act.



Boykin Hall Modernization Project






The **2023 Economic Outlook** for the Santa Clarita Valley was held on **Friday**, **Sept. 15**th, at the Performing Arts Center.


Manufacturing Day

- The Hart District helped secure buses to get the students from their schools to the ATC.








National Competition


The convening in the University Center lobby highlighted how College of the Canyons leverages the power of partnerships to fuel regional economies and support social mobility.






Red Dress Project Project

The Spring 2024 Semester is in Full Swing








The Spring 2024 semester is fully underway, with just over **13,000** students returning to campus, and **1,879** (credit=1,547 and noncredit=332) class sections being offered in a variety of formats.

As of the end of the first week of the spring semester, we have achieved **100**% of our target of **4,247 FTES**, which is **7**% higher than Spring 2023 as of the end of the first week of classes.









What's Ahead?

Baccalaureate Degree Proposal Status

COC submitted a proposal to the State Chancellor's Office for a Baccalaureate Degree (Sustainable Architecture) in January 2023.

- The Bachelor of Arts in Sustainable Architecture Degree program prepares students for Sustainable Building Certification System credential exams and employment in the A/E/C (Architecture/Engineering/Construction) Industry.
- Received Substantive Change proposal approval by ACCJC in preparation for program submission to the State.
- Notified of conditional approval by the State Chancellor's Office in May 2023.
- Received CSU duplication concerns in May 2023.
- Addressed CSU objections from Sacramento State with the State Chancellor's Office.
- Developed advocacy strategy:
 - ✓ Initiated effort with other CEOs
 - ✓ Requested legislators send a letter to State Chancellor
 - ✓ Discussed with State Chancellor
 - ✓ Presented solution to BOG member
 - ✓ Submitted opinion letter to Signal

ID.me



ID.me simplifies how individuals prove and share their identity online.

ID.me was implemented by CCCCO for people who apply through the CCCApply application. This is a way to deter fraud and stop bots from submitting hundreds of thousands of fraudulent applications every year.

- The ID.me process is used by entities such as the Social Security office, the IRS, and many other government agencies.
- Students will need to verify their identity through ID.me by providing their SSN, scanning their Driver's License or state ID, and taking a selfie for the program.
- Students who are undocumented, don't have an SSN, are under the age of 18, or are incarcerated cannot be verified through ID.me.
- There is a button that says "Verify later" if the student does not want or cannot use the ID.me product.

CCCID

The CCCCO is requiring all students to have a CCCID. The CCCID is generated when a person completes the first part of the CCCApply application.

- If a student completes a paper application (noncredit, Rising Scholars, ISAs, some dual enrollment populations, etc.) they do not get a CCCID.
- The CCCCO is now requiring the college to generate the CCCID on behalf of all students that do not complete the CCCApply application.
- This mandates all CCCs to generate an email and password to CCCApply for all students who use a paper application.
