- 6. Once we get through these initial days, weeks, months of the pandemic, then what? What should leaders be thinking of next?
- 7. How do you help divergent, even adversarial, individuals and groups work together and get beyondthe barriers?
- 8. What is the most important piece of advice you have for future community college leaders?
