Why a California community code

- Iargest system of higher education in the nation
- 50% of students do not pay fees
- composed of 73 districts and 116 colleges serving 2.1 million students per year.
- Ccc'S PREPARESTUDENTS FOR TRANSFER TO FOLR-YEAR INSTITUTIONS.
- Ccc'S 70% of our state's nurses
- CCCS train 80% of fir efighters, law enforcement personnel and emts
- 29% of uc and 51% of csu graduates started at a California community college
- AIMOST51% of UCs bachelor's degrees in science, technology, engineering and mathematics at the uc TRANSFERRED from ACcc.

What is AB540?

What is B540/Senate Bill 68(6)

Signed into law in October 2001, California Assembly Bill 540 (AB 540/SB 68) is a bill that provide exemption to the requirement to pay nonresiden California Community College students who are granted an AB 540/SB 68 exemption, will be estanged in and fees, and not the supplemental tuition charged to nonresidents.

- Requirements:
 - The student must have attended a high school (public or private) in California for three or more
- The student must have graduated from a California high school or attained the equivalent prior start of the term (for example, passing the GED, California High School Proficiency exam, or C of Completion).
- Arundocumentstudent whis without lawful immigration status must file an affidavit with the college or university stating that he or she has filed an application to legalize his or her immigra status, or will file an application as soon as he or she is eligible to do so.

PART ONE

Length of time & coursework completed per school

AND PART TWO

Degree Completion, Unit Requirements, GED or other

Three full-time years of attendance or attainment of equivalent credits earned in a California:

- High School
- Adult School²

FT attendance = min of 420 hrs/school year

Community College:

Credit courses 12 units/semester or quarter equivalent and max 2 years FT attendance

Noncredit courses FT attendance = min of 420 hrs/school year

or any combination of the above

OR

Three years of high school coursework and three years of total attendance in a California:

- » Elementary School
- » Secondary School
- » or any combination of these two.

Fullfill one of the following:

- » Graduate from a CA High School
- Obtain a certificate of completion, GED, HiSet or TASC in CA
- Attain an associate degree from a CA Community College
- Fulfill minimum transfer requirements for University of California or California State University

² California Adult school must be established by:

- County Office of Education
- Unified School District/High School District

The California Dream Act allows undocumented and nonresident students (US. Gtizens and eligible non-citizens) who qualify for a non-resident exemption under Assembly Bill 540 (AB540) to receive certain types of financial aid such as: private scholar ships funded through public universities, state administered financial aid, university grants, community college fee waivers, and Cal Grants. In addition, the California Dream Act, allows eligible students to pay in-state tuition at any public college in California.

Can I complete the CADA?

- You can if:
- You are Undocumented
- Have a valid or expired daca
- Uvisa holder
- Have a temporary protected status (tps)
- Meet the non-resident exemption requirements under ab 540

CANYONS PROMISE-CONTINUED

There are two main factors that determine eligibility for the program:

- You must be a first-time college student. You do not have to be a recent high school graduate.
 - You must be a California resident or ab540 eligible student.

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WHAT IS THE CALIFORNIA COLLEGE PROMISE GRANT?

- Different than the Canyon's PROMISE
- CCPCalifornia College Promise Grant
 - × Must be a California resident
 - × Only AVAILABLE at a California Commur
 - × Must have financial need
- Waives the \$46 per unit enrollment fee
- Short form application vs. FAFSA

pronavirus response and relief support appropriations act

COMDEmergency Relief Grants are intended to assist students with expenses related to the disruption of campus operations due to the ongoing nation-wide pandemic (including eligible expenses under a student's cost of attendance, such as food, housing, course materials, technology, health care, and childcare).



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CRRSAA EMERGENCY RELIEF GRANT Tobeleligible:

- students must be currently enrolled at College of the Canyons for the 2021-2022 academic year; including current non-degree seeking, non-credit, dual enrollment, or continuing education students (FAFSA, cadeparoof of financial need is not required
- DACA and undocumented students are ELIGIBLE to apply
- The COVID Emergency Relief Constrists,000 for fulltime (split into two payments).
- (12.0 more units) (\$R,500 for pattme(less than 12.0 units)

CRRSAA EMERGENCY RELIEF GRANT

- The OMDEmergency Relief Grant amount is \$3,000 for full-time (12.0 or more units) OR\$1,500 for part-time (less than 12.0 units). Grants will be disbursed based on a student's enrollment status 10 days prior to the scheduled disbursement. No adjustments will be made due to changes in enrollment status.
 - The US. Department of Education has prioritized students with the greatest demonstrated financial need for immediate disbursement of funds.
 - Students that are currently enrolled, that are **NOT eligible for a Federal Pell** Grant may ubmit an application a COVID Emergency Relief Grant

STEPS AND TOOLS TO APPLY FOR CA DREAM ACT

Phase 1. Apply for C-A Dream Act - Ociober 1 - March 2 Checklist for the 2021-22 CA Dream Application Applying for the CA Dream Act is only the first step 10 receiving state-based financial aid. This checklist helps you successfully apply for and be considered for all attate financial aid.

Phase 2. Apply for Cal Grant - October 1 - March 2 Checklist to Apply for the 2021-22 Cal Grant Use this checklist to successfully apply for the Cal Grant. Too many students forget this step and miss out on financial aid they are elicible for!

Phase 3. Claim Your Ald - March - May Verifying Your Income for the CA Dream Act Application

Don't let income verification stop you from receiving your financial aid. Understand the necessary documentation you must provide and requirements for dependent versus independent students and tax files versus non-tax files.

Phase 4. Use your Ald - May - September Selective Service and CA Dream Act

Are you a mails between the sage of 18 and 20 years old? Bo sure to register for the nelective service and show proof to your collegio or university. You may not receive your infrancial aid if you miss this step. We've also included information for individuals who are over 26, but nover registered.
