

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




















The STEM Equity
Alliance assists
underrepresented
students striving to enter
the field of STEM (Science,
Technology, Engineering
and Math). The alliance's
focus is to offer a helping
hand with career building

skills and scholarship opportunities. These come in the form of internships, career workshops such as STEM week, and resumebuilding assistance. STEM Equity Alliance also offers financial assistance through the C-Scholars Program which is funded by the National Science Foundation. Additionally, they focus on networking with those established in the field, team building, and breaking down barriers in STEM. If you're interested in joining the STEM Equity Alliance, they meet virtually through Zoom Fridays on selected dates.

Alliance, Erin Delany, says, these efforts "just makes the campus a more friendly and welcoming place for trans and non-binary students."


Interested in joining an alliance? College of the Canyons offers other alliances, including:

ATTENTION COUGARS!



Do you plan on graduating in our Spring 2023 semester? Have you already petitioned to graduate?

Petitioning to graduate is required if you are looking to earn an Associate degree or a certificate of completion. You must submit your degree or certification to the Counseling Office by the end of the first week of the semester in which you plan to graduate. This means if you're planning on graduating in Spring, your petition must be turned in by the end of the first week of the spring semester. The requirements for your Certificate of Completion are a bit more flexible, as they can be submitted before your last semester or up until the final day of your awarding term.

In order to submit your petition, you must have submitted transcripts from other colleges or universities you've attended and confirmed that your degree or certificate requirements are complete (or will be complete during the upcoming semester). Then, you can visit our Counseling Office via Express Drop-In Counseling to submit your petition. BANC INFORMATION



We all encounter hurdles in our lives, whether it be from financial worries, family issues, or any other personal struggle. This is where the Basic Needs Center (BaNC) comes in, serving as a pillar of support at College of the Canyons that provides substantial resources to both the Valencia and Canyon Country Campus. Sarah Cox, who works at the Valencia Campus BaNC, states that their mission is to help students "...remove those barriers and continue on their academic journey."

Some resources that the center offers include financial assistance (e.g., utility bills, medical bills), housing, transportation, and even free meals at the Cougar Café. Additional resources consist of

personal hygiene products, clothing, and vouchers for books. Students may, if eligible, also apply for related programs through the center for further assistance. These related programs include both Fresh Success and CalFresh. They provide students with career preparation as well as funds for groceries.

From meal vouchers to medical bills, the Basic Needs Center aids students in nearly every feasible way. 
